The McIntyre Mini Globe Race (MGR)

You have all been made aware of the Vendee Globe in a previous issue of the Semaphore. The Vendee Globe round-the-world time is 64 days 19 hours 22 minutes and 49 seconds using the Great Capes route and the stormy southern ocean. The Great Capes are <u>Cape of Good Hope</u>, <u>Cape Leeuwin</u>, and <u>Cape Horn</u>

Now we are talking about the 2006 Mini Globe Race (MGR). There are 5 legs with rest, recreation and refurbishment stops in between. At present the competitors are

heading towards Cape Town, South Africa. The Mini Globe uses the "gentle" trade winds route although it is still necessary to dip south to round South Africa.

In an age where technology and \$25 million can send a solo sailor around the world in about 60 days, a fleet of courageous mini sailors is about to show it can be done for less than \$60,000 over many days! The current Mini Globe Race follows in the footsteps of John Guzzwell's 1955 world's first solo voyage in a 20ft home built

Trekka.



Some excitement

At approx. 0300hrs UTC 17th Oct. 2025 72 year old Australian Eric Marsh reported to MGR that he was safe back onboard SUNBEAR his ALMA Class Globe 5.80 after being swept from the foredeck at night by a large wave while putting his spinnaker pole away. He was then being dragged by his tether and auto inflated Life jacket at 5-6kts. After many attempts, hampered by his inflated jacket, he was finally able to drag himself to the port quarter of the boat and struggle back onboard, wet and still very shaken, he reported, "It was the scariest time of my life! I honestly thought it was all over for me! After many attempts to get back onboard I am very thankful I am onboard." He immediately made an emotional call to his wife and Safety Manager to report that all was OK. The boats are now heading down the eastern coast of Southern Africa where the Agulhas Current with it's countercurrents and big waves will be a constant threat and challenge.

The McIntyre Mini Globe Race (MGR)



The yachts, known as "Class Globe 580", are one design home-built for backyard builders. They are built from plywood on timber frames and coated in glass epoxy. 580 refers to its length in meters, which is compact enough to fit in a 20ft container to and from international events. Conceived by Australian adventurer Don McIntyre, the idea emerged during his 2010 adventure sailing 4000-mile across the Pacific in an open timber whale boat with very little food, water and no charts, which recreated William Bligh's Mutiny on the Bounty journey. McIntyre, in collaboration with Polish designer Janusz Maderski, launched the one-design class in 2019, offering simple construction plans for €300. Builders can also opt for a CNC pre-cut plywood kit, supported by an active online builder's community. Currently, over 80 yachts are in various stages of completion, with about 20 in the water and another 140 builders with plans.

Competitors

Sixteen men and two women from 11 countries are navigating 28,000 miles solo around the world in identical, cramped plywood mini yachts, pushing the limits of what many believe to be possible. They range in age from 23 to 72 years.

The youngest is Briton, Jasmine Harrison. In 2021, when she was 21, she achieved worldwide recognition, becoming the youngest solo female to row the Atlantic Ocean. In 2022 she was the first female to swim the full length of the British Isles, from Lands' End to John o' Groats.

The oldest at 72, is Australian, Eric Marsh, who had always wanted to sail around the world.

Between these two in age are Swiss, French, Britons and Americans. There is even a father and son duo sailing on separate boats, Mike and John Blenkinsop.

Ensign Season Over

Going into the races on October 30, *Red Stripe* (McCroklin/Eckenroth) was tied with *Blue Note* (Hittner/Brennesholtz) for the lead in the Fall Series. The three races that day gave *Blue Note* a one-point lead, making the November 8 races decisive. Unfortunately, November 8 was very warm and very flat. After an hour of working on our tans, the RC abandoned for the day. Ensigns and SJ's had to be towed back to the dock. For the series of 21 potential races, three were cancelled for too much wind and six for lack

of wind! Blue Note won the series and the years championship. Red Stripe was second and Blake Sohn's Long Shot was third.

We were happy to see several SJ's out. Mark Weinheimer's *Deuces Wild* competed in nine races and took first for the season. Hans Lassen in *Road Runner* and the Brock/Talbert *Squirrels on Highway* came in second and third. All three SJ's won at least three races. It was fun (mostly) having them at the starts and roundings. The Ensigns and SJ's are close in rating with the former doing better in heavy air and the latter in light stuff.

NYRA Halloween/Winter Series Begins

The Neuse Yacht Racing Association began November 1 as the Halloween Race, as always. A fine turnout of Navigator Class boats used staggered block starts to get nine boats underway on a dis-

tance course of 6.3 miles down and up river. After nearly three hours, Ed Thompson sailed *Dutch Wind* (one of the biggest boats out there) corrected first by less that 1.5 minutes ahead of Sheldon Shikoluk in *Puffin* (the smallest boat racing)! Ed took first, Sheldon took second, and Jeff Boenig corrected to third in *Kokomo*.

Five competed in the PHRF Spinnaker Class. With ratings ranging from 110 to 264, the handicapping is not ideal, and more boats would allow divisions within the class. But, alas...

Scoring was varied, but not particularly tight except for one spread of 7 seconds and another less than a minute. Ensign *Blue Note* had two firsts and a fourth and tied with S2 7.9 *Patriot* skippered by Jonathon Brown was 3, 2, and 1, so *Patriot* won the Halloween Spin Class on the tie breaker (first in the last race).

Winter Series #2 on November 15 was a bit of a crap shoot for air. Sometimes it was decent and sometimes glassy, but always shifty. Eight Navigator Class competitors with a carbon copy at the top. *Dutch Wind* beat *Puffin* after close to three hours. Regina Ali, who did not compete Halloween, came in third in *Crescendo*. For the series, *Dutch Wind*, *Puffin*, and Paul Mills's *Vertical Wing* are ahead. From fourth to ninth remains tight.



Anxious sailors gathered in the clubhouse for the 0930 Competitor's Meeting for the annual Turkey Trot Regatta. The atmosphere was enthusiastic, the usual information offered, and then the hopeful question - "Will we be sailing in the Creek or the Neuse?" "Unfortunately, with the wind from the west there wouldn't be enough room" came the response.


So, 51 brave souls in 38 one-designs ventured out on the Neuse in 10 to 14 knots... usually a welcome amount of breeze. But once on the course conditions changed. The steady breeze began to oscillate, built to 14 to 17, and gusts came in anywhere from 18 to 22! The puffy, oscillating wind and consequential wave action in the first race tested all on the water...competitors and race committee alike! The biggest challenge appeared to be for the 23 boat Sunfish Class with multiple capsizes, but the 420 Class was not immune! Righting a boat in short-chop waves and gusty wind takes strength, determination, balance, and timing! Many were able to recover and continue - many were not. Race committee running craft, with the help of spectators, sprang into action rendering assistance and escort to safety.

While the majority of the carnage was happening in the first half of the windward legs, the scene at the weather mark was anything but benign! Port-starboards, windward-leewards, inside overlaps, and crash tacks made for some exciting moments! Amazingly, collisions were not part of the scene... an obvious testament to a combination of great boat handling and pure luck!



Hooray for the Race Committee!!

Last weekend's TurkeyTrot race was a very windy affair, with sunfish sailors having a rough time. Several capsized and had a hard time re-righting their boats. If the race committee mark/safety boats were not on hand, a couple of sailors could have drowned. The Race Committee does a lot more than efficiently run the races, they supply support and help to sailors in need.



Holiday Lighted Boat Parade

Cool Weather Is Upon Us


Water to the docks will be interrupted when the predicted temperatures dip to 25F below.


